# SAFE STREETS CHERRY HILL

A Public Health  
Initiative to Reduce  
Homicides and Shootings



## Our Goal:

**Safe Streets Cherry Hill** is a campaign to reduce shootings and homicides in our community.

We are working to change how our community thinks about violence.

Violence is often accepted as an appropriate—even expected—way to solve conflict.

Safe Streets Cherry Hill argues that violence is a disease and we, together, need to find the cure.



## What We Do:

In order to make violence less common in our neighborhood, we work to identify, detect, and interrupt violence *before* it happens. We offer:

- Conflict mediation services
- Events in partnership with other community groups, organizations, and residents to promote non-violence
- Links to resources; including education & employment

## 2015 Highlights:

In 2015, Safe Streets Cherry Hill:

- Conducted 151 mediations, 99% of which were very likely or likely to have led to a shooting if the mediation did not occur.
- Safe Streets reached a period of 440 days without a firearm homicide in 2015 (4/23/14 to 7/6/2015).
- There were 5 shooting incidents (fatal and non-fatal) in 2015. Cherry Hill was one of two Safe Streets Sites that had lower monthly averages of shooting incidents compared to border posts and a citywide composite of high violence posts.
